**THE SCHOOLS.**- The schools were re-opened on June 21<sup>st</sup>, and we are thankful that the epidemic of measles has abated. The attendance has been larger than we expected. We announce with deep regret the resignation of Miss Alice Greenway, headmistress of the Infant School. Her services have been invaluable, and her school has been a model and a joy during the 12 ½ years she has been with us. She will leave us on Sept. 30<sup>th</sup> to take up a similar post at Linslade, where her home is.

**WING FLOWER SHOW.**- The annual Flower Show will be held (by kind permission of Mr. Rothschild), at Ascott, on Bank Holiday, August 2<sup>nd</sup>, but of course, not on the usual scale.

**ECONOMY, PATRIOTISM AND THRIFT.**- I wish to commend to all householders and house-wives:-

(1) The following notice issued by the Board of Trade:-“In view of the increased demands for meat by the British and French Armies and of the relative shortage of vessels equipped for the conveyance of meat from overseas, the Board of Trade wish to call the attention of the public to the great importance of restricting the consumption of meat so as to economise the national supplies and avoid an excessive rise in prices.”

Also (2) the directions respecting Investment through the Post Office in the national war loan. Scrip vouchers for 5s., 10s. or £1 may be purchased and accumulated until £5, or a multiple of £5, is reached. These vouchers will be exchanged for stock in December, 1915. Interest at 5 per cent plus a bonus of 1s. will be allowed on vouchers so exchanged. All who invest what they can spare in this way will be helping at once their country and themselves. Full particulars can be got from the Post Office, Wing.

**ROLL OF HONOUR.**- The list of Wing men serving in various capacities has been revised and brought up to date. It contains 126 names and is placed in the Church porch.

**MOTHERS' UNION QUARTERLY MEETING.**- The summer meeting was held on June 30<sup>th</sup>, and (as usual) in the Vicarage garden. There was a large attendance of members, some 80 being present. A very practical and interesting address was given by the Vicar's cousin, Miss Mary Tatham, of Highgate.

**WING PROVIDENT DISPENSARY.**- The annual general meeting was not held this year, and the committee of last year continue to hold office. The following report and balance sheet would have been printed in the April Magazine had we been able to find room for it, but “better late than never,” and we publish it now. “The committee beg to present the report and balance sheet for the year 1914 (the 19<sup>th</sup> year of the Wing Dispensary on its present footing). They note a further decrease

in the number of members, viz., from 489 in 1913 to 452 in 1914. This is due to the extended working of the Insurance Act. The Dispensary is as useful and necessary as before, though it ought now to be carried on at less cost to the subscribers. The contributions collected in Church and the Chapels were somewhat less than last year, and the outbreak of the war prevented the house to house collection in August. A kind donation of £4 from the Football Committee was therefore most opportune. The committee records with thankfulness the remarkable freedom from illness in the village during the year 1914. The Rev. A. E. Baynes has taken on the office of Secretary in place of Rev. G. V. Kendrick.
